



WHAT DOES OUR SUPPORT LOOK LIKE?

Jay started attending our GUD program when he was 18 months old with his home child care provider. His mom is a teen mother with many struggles. She receives a child care subsidy which allows her son to be cared for by a home child care provider while she works and attends school at night. This particular caregiver attends our playgroup twice a week, never missing. When Jay first started attending the playgroup he had minimal vocabulary and his receptive language was poor. He had a hard time reading cues and did not have clear boundaries he was used to. The program facilitator and caregiver decided to take a proactive approach and provide positive feedback immediately when he was found participating in appropriate activities. They used his interests and capabilities to build upon his learning and increase his successes in the program. Jay's mother quickly saw the progress Jay was making; his vocabulary was increasing, he was now able to follow one to two step directions, and best of all he was proud of his accomplishments.

This past September, Jay started attending school. The support Jay received while in care and attending our program, allowed him to feel safe and secure, practice important skills and increase his self-esteem and overall development in order to start school feeling confident and ready. We are proud we were able to be a supportive part of his young life.

The Parent Resource Centre works in partnership with families and communities to provide responsive programs and services that meet the needs of children, youth and families in our community. We would not be able to achieve PRC's mission without our dedicated and committed community partners, as well as the families we work with. At PRC, we are fortunate to work with a diverse group of community partners and in different capacities, which allows us to create new opportunities and better services to meet the needs of those we serve. We would like to extend a special thank you to the Vanier Community Service Centre for the many years of collaboration on such projects as the Vanier Circle of Care program, the many StoryWalk® events held in the community and their active role on the Ottawa Vanier Best Start planning table, as well as to Grandir Ensemble for the many years of programming offered at PRC which have enabled us to support the Francophone families in our community. Thank you to all our wonderful partners and families.

Highlight Partnership

Starting in 2012 and until most recently in August of 2014, we have been working in partnership with l'Association francophone à l'éducation des services à l'enfance de l'Ontario or l'Aféseo. With the transfer of child care to the Ministry of Education in 2012 and the many changes that followed, we signed an agreement using Monique Lanthier's expertise in the early learning field to work with l'Aféseo to update their manual called "Gestion Dynamique". Since then, we have continued to work together with the understanding that many early years educators and staff need supports regarding the ELECT framework that are simple, clear and consistent across the province. With the ELS mandate to promote and support Early Learning and Early Literacy and l'Aféseo's mandate to support all those who have a role in educating young children across the province, we saw an opportunity to work together. The pilot project: "Mettons le C.A.P.E. sur le CAPE" was created. This was an ambitious project with the mandate to offer specialized training workshops, increase the knowledge and competences of frontline child care staff, managers and parents, offer on-going coaching and mentoring so that in turn those trained would then become community trainers-mentors to integrate the ELECT principles in a consistent way to all early years programs involved. The pilot project was successful, producing a well-documented report of support services needed for front-line early learning professionals, as well as many hands-on resources and training workshops that continue to be shared with the Francophone Early Learning sector to this day.
